The George Washington University is located in the heart of Washington, at the core of U.S. government, policy and law. GWU's students and faculty have the unparalleled opportunity to study and work alongside leaders and practitioners in every discipline, to take part in the interchanges that shape our community and the world.

Location:

Washington, DC, United States

AUS Requirements/ Eligibility:

- 1. Sophomores encouraged to apply; must have at least 60 credits by program start date; seniors may not go in last semester.
- 2. Must not go during graduating semester (last semester).
- 3. Must have at least a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or above.

AUS Placement Availability and Likelihood:

Please be aware that spaces in this program may be limited, and the number of spaces available for AUS placements will vary from semester to semester. That means that sometimes, access to these spaces will be competitive based on your cumulative GPA, Essay, Reference Letters, and other considerations. AUS International Exchange Office (IXO) will try to accommodate your first choice placements wherever possible, but you should always list several programs in your application, in case space is not available in your first choice university.

Length of Stay:

One or two semesters.

Courses:

Exchange students can choose from a variety of undergraduate courses numbered between 0000-4999. They cannot register for graduate level courses (like those in Law or Medical schools) and program course offerings from Semester in Washington. CAAD: There are no CAAD courses for AUS students available at GWU.

CAS: Students may take a wide range of courses offered by any of GWU's schools. Courses are subject to approval by GWU.

CEN: The School of Engineering and Applied Sciences from GWU is ABET-accredited for the following programs:

- Biomedical Engineering
- Civil Engineering
- Computer Science
- Electrical Engineering
- Mechanical Engineering
- Computer Engineering

SBA: The School of Business at GWU is AACSB-approved. Students are encouraged to take their general education (humanities, etc.), free electives and Business electives (MJR or MIN electives). Students can also take major or required courses during their study abroad semester after getting the approval from SBA at AUS. Students should be aware that Finance classes fill up quickly, so there are no guarantees that students will be placed in these classes. Students on the Finance waitlist will not be allowed to bypass the waitlist. The most competitive classes in Finance & Business Administration are FINA4001/4001W: Advanced Financial Management and BADM4801: Strategy Formulationand Implementation.

AUS Course Approval:

Upon getting the placement from IXO, students should plan on working on their <u>AUS Course Permission Form</u> and get their classes approved by the department's designated approver for the courses that will be taken abroad. Upon approval, students would be provided with the grades required to transfer credits. Students must achieve the minimum grade as indicated on the form to receive course credit (requirements for credit transfer vary by program).

Each study abroad case is subject to approval.

Program Fees and Costs:

Exchange students pay AUS tuition fees for the full course load (12-16 credits) in addition to Student Activities fees. Any additional costs including housing, lab fees, meal plans, books and insurance will be paid directly to the host university.

AUS Financial Grants and Scholarships:

AUS students on grants/scholarships must obtain approval from the OFGS (Office of Financial Grants and Scholarships) before starting a semester abroad at a host university. In cases where the AUS student pays tuition directly to AUS for study abroad, the student will continue to use their AUS grants and AUS-funded scholarships for that semester abroad. These students should contact the Financial Grants and Scholarship Manager scholarship@aus.edu for more information.

AUS Sponsored Students:

Students sponsored by external organizations that are in partnership with the AUS Sponsorship Liaison Office will be responsible for asking permission from their sponsor. A Letter to the Sponsor is available from the International Exchange Office. Please contact ixo@ aus.edu.

Housing/Accommodation:

GWU's residence options range from traditional co-ed halls and apartment styled halls with private bathroom, to townhouses for students with preference to seniority. Exchange students are placed in rooms with one or several roommates depending on the dormitory they are allotted to. Recently, students have been placed in Philip Amsterdam Hall and City Hall.

Visa:

Students must apply to the US Embassy/Consulate to obtain their J1 Exchange Visitor Visa. They must make an appointment and follow up with the required documentation, such as the letter of acceptance and bank statement.
