Chinese University of Hong Kong (CUHK):

Founded in 1963, The Chinese University of Hong Kong is a non-profit public higher education institution located in the suburban setting of the metropolis of Hong Kong (population range of over 5,000,000 inhabitants). Officially accredited and/or recognized by the Education Bureau, Hong Kong SAR, The Chinese University of Hong Kong (CUHK) is a large coeducational higher education institution. The Chinese University of Hong Kong (CUHK) offers courses and programs leading to bachelor degrees, master degrees, doctorate degrees in several areas of study. CUHK has a selective admission policy based on entrance examinations and students' past academic record and grades.

Hong Kong is an autonomous territory, and former British colony, in southeastern China. Its vibrant, densely populated urban centre is a major port and global financial hub with a skyscraper-studded skyline. Central (the business district) features architectural landmarks like I.M. Pei's Bank of China Tower. Hong Kong is also a major shopping destination, famed for bespoke tailors and Temple Street Night Market.

Location:

Shatin, Hong Kong, China

Requirements/Eligibility:

- Sophomores encouraged to apply; must have at least 60 credits by program start date; seniors may not go in last semester.
- 2. Must have at least a cumulative GPA of 2.5 or above
- 3. Must be an undergraduate student
- 4. Must not be in graduating year (Engineering majors)

Length of Stay:

One or two semesters.

AUS Placement Availability and Likelihood:

Please be aware that spaces in this program may be limited, and the number of spaces available for AUS placements will vary from semester to semester. That means that sometimes, access to these spaces will be competitive based on your cumulative GPA, Essay, Reference Letters, and other considerations. AUS International Exchange Office (IXO) will try to accommodate your first choice placements wherever possible, but you should always list several programs in your application, in case space is not available in your first choice university.

Courses:

CUHK offers undergraduate level courses under the faculties of Arts, Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Law, Medicine, Science, and Social Science. Cantonese is the main spoken language in Hong Kong, but CUHK is a multilingual university, with English or Putonghua (Mandarin) used as the languages of instruction for many courses.

Overseas exchange and study-abroad students can take most undergraduate courses.

At CUHK, one unit or credit is roughly equivalent to one hour of instruction per week. Most three-unit courses feature either three hours of lectures or two hours of lectures and one hour of tutorials per week. Students receive credits for all courses successfully completed, according to the academic standards of the department. All undergraduate exchange and study-abroad students will need to take a full load of courses, meaning between 9 and 18 units per term.

CAAD: No architecture courses offered.

CAS: Students are open to a wide range of courses offered. Courses are subject to approval.

HKIE is a signatory of the Washington Accord and programs accredited by HKIE are recognized by the Washington Accord. Students can take major or required courses at CUHK after getting their approval from the College of Engineering at AUS.

SBA: The business school at CUHK is AACSB accredited. Students can take major or required courses during their study abroad semester after getting the approval from their Associate Dean. Business students can also take their general education, free electives and business electives (major and minor electives).

AUS Course Approval:

Upon getting the placement from IXO, students should plan on working on their <u>AUS Course Permission Form</u> and get their classes approved by the department's designated approver for the courses that will be taken abroad. Upon approval, students would be provided with the grades required to transfer credits. Students must achieve the minimum grade as indicated on the form to receive course credit (requirements for credit transfer vary by program). Each study abroad case is subject to approval.

Program Fees and Costs:

Exchange students pay AUS tuition fees for the full course load (12-16 credits) in addition to Student Activities fees. Any additional costs including housing, lab fees, meal plans, books and insurance will be paid directly to the host university.

Financial Grants and Scholarships:

AUS students on grants/scholarships must obtain approval from the Office of Financial Grants and Scholarships before starting a semester abroad at a host university. In cases where the AUS student pays tuition directly to AUS for study abroad, the student will continue to use their AUS grants and AUS-funded scholarships for that semester abroad. These students should speak with the Financial Grants and Scholarship Manager for more information. Students sponsored by an organization outside of AUS are responsible for making arrangements with their sponsor.

AUS Sponsored Students:

Students sponsored by external organizations that are in partnership with the AUS Sponsorship Liaison Office will be responsible for asking permission with their sponsor. A Letter to the Sponsor is available from the International Exchange Office. Please contact ixo@aus.edu.

Housing/Accommodation:

CUHK provides affordable and convenient on-campus dormitories to students. More information about the cost can be found on http://www.oal.cuhk.edu.hk/usap/.

Visa:

Students will need to apply for a student visa from the Hong Kong Immigration Department through the Office of Academic Links (OAL), their local sponsor, before coming to Hong Kong. It usually takes five to seven weeks for the Immigration Department to process a student visa or entry-permit application; therefore, students should submit their visa application to the OAL at least two months before the commencement of the orientation week.

Health Insurance:

International exchange students are required to purchase insurance. Students must purchase their own global medical insurance and personal accident injury insurance before they come to study in China.
